1. Course Description

This course explores Seoul's rich architectural landscape through multiple lenses, spanning from centuries-old palaces to cutting-edge landmarks. The program integrates classroom lectures with two field trips to sites, including Changdeokgung Palace, Jongmyo Shrine, and Dongdaemun Design Plaza (DDP). Students will develop comprehensive perspectives on Seoul and also understand how Korean spatial concepts intersect with contemporary designs in Seoul's built environment.
