I. Course Overview

1. Course Description

Global interest in Korean culture in recent years has led to the emergence of not only K-pop and K-drama but also K-gugak. This heightened interest in K-gugak has made both domestic and foreign listeners wonder about the historical background and musical genres of Korean traditional music. Korean culture plays a very unique role in today's global culture, and this course is designed to introduce the most traditional aspects of Korean music. Through various traditional genres and practical exercises, this course will expose students to Korean traditional music in a fun and easy way.

Interestingly, this cultural wave has also inspired creative reinterpretations in global media—for example, the animated film K-Pop Demon Hunters, which combines modern K-pop aesthetics with traditional Korean motifs, reflects how Korean cultural elements are being reimagined worldwide. Today, as the Korean Wave continues to influence global cultural trends, this course offers students an opportunity to explore the roots of that wave by experiencing Korea's traditional music in an engaging and enjoyable way.
