I. Course Overview

1. Course Description

Korea's history is one of rapid transformation, defined by the urgency of industrialization following Japanese occupation. After the Korean War, Seoul's cityscape had to be redrawn from the ashes. Most historical buildings and structures were lost, and even those that remained were often neglected. At the time, Koreans placed the highest priority on achieving prosperity and shedding the label of the world's poorest country. Efficiency became the guiding principle in nearly every decision, including construction. In this regard, Koreans owe a debt of gratitude to the pioneering modernist architects who shaped the nation's built environment.

As time passed, the world began to take notice—companies like Samsung and Hyundai became global leaders, and Korean artists started appearing on the Billboard Top 100 and winning Academy Awards. By then, we found ourselves surrounded by a cityscape shaped by decades of compressed development. This somewhat chaotic and hybridized landscape—whether intentional or not—can be beautiful to some and overwhelming to others. What is certain, however, is that it is rich, dynamic, and uniquely characterized.

This course invites you to explore this strange yet fascinating city with me. As we walk through its streets, we will encounter remnants of the past alongside newly built structures. You will be encouraged to observe the city through the lens of your own cultural background and to share your perspective with others from different walks of life.

The final outcome of this course will take the form of a moving image. Rather than following pre-existing genres, students are expected to push boundaries—not only through visual experimentation, but also by exploring the role of sound in shaping new possibilities.

2. Prerequisites

There are no prerequisites for this class except for the ability and willingness to observe, discuss, and create with your own eyes and hands. Additionally, a basic level of English proficiency is needed for communication in class.
